The Rose Foundation has developed a specialized program to act as trustee over restitution payments from litigation settlements, and administer grants to community organizations in conformance with the nexus of the settlement.		
<b>Arc Ecology</b> <i>Hunters Point Design Studio Project</i>	\$10,000	Defrays costs for a team of Harvard University landscape architecture graduate students to develop plans to remediate wetlands and propose other improvements for a heavily contaminated, but ecologically rich, part of Hunters Point.
<b>Bay Institute</b> <i>San Joaquin Delta Water Quality Project</i>	\$30,000	Helps support development of models for Delta habitats, ecosystem processes, stressors, and key species to help environmental groups evaluate policy solutions being debated in regulatory and stakeholder processes.
<b>Bio-Integral Resource Center</b> <i>“Ask the Expert” Interactive Website Project</i>	\$10,300	For the “Ask the Expert” interactive portion of the <a href="http://www.ourwaterourworld.org">www.ourwaterourworld.org</a> website where the public can ask questions about pesticide toxicity and alternatives.
<b>Blue Green Alliance</b> Fiscal sponsor: Public Health Institute <i>Green Chemistry and Oil Refining Pilot Project</i>	\$30,000	Supports a pilot project of the United Steelworkers and the Sierra Club to connect local refinery workers with experts in the emerging field of green chemistry. The project includes a green chemistry education program to identify solutions and options to reduce toxic releases and waste from oil refining.
<b>Butte Environmental Council</b> <i>North Sacramento Valley Water Advocacy &amp; Education Program</i>	\$27,000	Supports ongoing community education, monitoring, and advocacy programs to reduce pollution to the Sacramento River watershed.
<b>California Sportfishing Protection Alliance</b> <i>Watershed Enforcers Project</i>	\$75,000	For a citizen monitoring and enforcement network dedicated to protecting the water quality of the entire San Francisco Bay watershed.
<b>California Water Impact Network</b> <i>Strategic Actions to Save the Delta</i>	\$50,000	Helps support water rights and water quality regulatory advocacy and litigation focused on the State Water Resources Control Board and the Department of Water Resources.
<b>Californians for Pesticide Reform</b> Fiscal sponsor: Pesticide Action Network <i>Central Valley Pesticide Campaign</i>	\$25,000	Over 100 million pounds of pesticides are applied every year in the San Joaquin Valley – these toxins run off into Sacramento/San Joaquin Delta waterways, where 750 plant and animal species have their home and 25 million Californians derive their drinking water. Funding supports organizing in farmworker communities to develop a strong constituency for reduced pesticide use.
<b>Carpinteria Valley Association</b> Fiscal sponsor: Carpinteria Valley Foundation <i>Opposition to Project Paredon</i>	\$9,000	Supports grassroots opposition to a huge new slant oil drilling tower proposed to be built on DDT-contaminated land near a residential neighborhood and adjacent to the scenic Carpinteria bluffs and a seal haul-out area.

<b>Center for Biological Diversity</b> <i>Bay &amp; Delta Water Quality Campaign</i>	\$15,000	To protect key water quality indicator species including Green Sturgeon and Delta Smelt, by challenging governmental agencies to consider pesticide impacts, plus public education about the environmental and health dangers of pesticides.
<b>Center for Community Action and Environmental Justice</b> <i>Perchlorate Contamination Project</i>	\$5,000	Helps support grassroots efforts to force the cleanup of a toxic compound from rocket fuel that has polluted the water supply of the low income, predominantly Latino community of Rialto.
<b>Central Sierra Environmental Resource Center</b> <i>Protect Mokelumne River Water Resources</i>	\$27,000	Helps support education of government officials and the community about excessive sedimentation and other run-off problems associated with bulldozing oak woodland habitat and clear-cutting forests in the Mokelumne River watershed.
<b>City of Bakersfield</b> <i>Electric Woodchipper</i>	\$280,000	50% matching funds for an electric wood chipper, which replaced an aging 800 hp diesel chipper.
<b>Clean Water Fund</b> <i>Delta Water Quality Outreach Project</i>	\$27,000	Helps support work with communities to advocate for tough regulatory standards for mercury pollution in the Delta.
<b>Clean Water Fund</b> <i>SF Bay &amp; Delta TMDL Project</i>	\$15,000	For technical support related to the creation of Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) standards for various toxic pollutants discharged into San Francisco Bay.
<b>Clean Water Fund (Massachusetts)</b> <i>Litigation Support</i>	\$5,000	Provides seed money to initiate a citizen enforcement program addressing Clean Water Act violations.
<b>Communities for a Better Environment</b> <i>Toxic Fallout Prevention Project</i>	\$25,000	Helps support organizing and advocacy to address the cumulative impacts of smokestack pollution from oil refineries. In addition to harming public health, deposition of refinery emissions and associated run-off contributes 10 times more toxic pollution to the Bay than point source discharges.
<b>Community Alliance with Family Farmers</b> <i>Protecting Water Quality Through On-Farm Habitat</i>	\$18,000	Supports advocacy of the value of biological processes and the promotion and planting of native hedgerows and other on-farm habitats that attract beneficial insects and reduces pesticide usage and toxic run-off.
<b>Community Water Center</b> <i>Asociación de Gente Unida por el Agua (AGUA)</i>	\$30,000	The Community Water Center and AGUA work with low-income Latino farmworkers in the Central Valley who bear the brunt of pollution impacts from intensive fertilizer and pesticide applications, and confined animal feeding and processing operations.
<b>EarthTeam</b> <i>Richmond High School Creek Care Program</i>	\$44,000	Supports a creek stewardship program at Richmond High School focused on local watershed ecology and restoration, including hands-on shoreline and creek restoration projects, wildlife surveys and water quality monitoring.
<b>Ecological Rights Foundation</b> <i>NPDES Permit Survey</i>	\$12,500	Supports a comprehensive survey of water pollution discharge permit status in the Bay Area. Results will be shared with governmental agencies to aid compliance programs.
<b>Environmental Justice Coalition for Water</b> <i>Water Justice in the Delta</i>	\$45,000	Supports community participation in the <i>Delta Visions</i> stakeholder process by a network of 60 grassroots environmental justice organizations concerned about water quality and public health issues.

<p><b>First Amendment Project</b> <i>Environmental Advocacy Fellowship</i></p>	<p>\$25,000</p>	<p>Helps support the continued dissemination of the <i>Environmental Activists’ Guide to Avoiding Defamation and Other Publication Lawsuits</i>, which helps activists safely raise toxic pollution and wilderness protection issues without fear of reprisal by SLAPP lawsuits designed to silence activists’ opposition to pollution and environmental resource threats.</p>
<p><b>Friends of the Pinole Creek Watershed</b> Fiscal sponsor: The Watershed Project <i>General Support</i></p>	<p>\$5,000</p>	<p>Helps defray costs of community meetings, newsletter production, water quality monitoring, bio-monitoring, and a native plant restoration project in Pinole Creek, which runs through Pinole, Hercules and unincorporated areas of Contra Costa County and discharges into San Pablo Bay.</p>
<p><b>Golden Gate Audubon</b> <i>Eco-Oakland/Eco-Richmond Program</i></p>	<p>\$15,000</p>	<p>Helps support the Eco-Oakland Program, a year-round, hands-on environmental education program for inner city youth that has served nearly 10,000 students since its inception in 1999, and also helps defray the expansion of the program into Richmond. Activities include creek restoration, exploration of nearby wetlands, watershed mapping, trash and invasive plant removal, and classroom activities.</p>
<p><b>Global Community Monitor</b> Fiscal sponsor: Tides Center <i>Student Pollution Monitoring</i></p>	<p>\$10,000</p>	<p>Global Community Monitor trains and supports communities throughout the world in responding to toxic pollution threats. Funding supports training McClymonds High School Students in monitoring pollution the affects San Francisco Bay.</p>
<p><b>Green Sangha</b> <i>Rethinking Plastics Campaign</i></p>	<p>\$10,000</p>	<p>Supports advocacy towards the elimination of disposable plastic bags through public education, partnerships with businesses, outreach to county and city officials, and advocating for waste fees to discourage the use of disposable plastics. Plastics make up 51% of trash in Bay Area creeks.</p>
<p><b>Kern County Superintendent of Schools</b> <i>CNG School Buses</i></p>	<p>\$329,935</p>	<p>50% matching funds for four compressed natural gas fueled school buses, which replace 4 old diesel school buses.</p>
<p><b>Kids for the Bay</b> <i>Richmond Area Schools Watershed Action Programs</i></p>	<p>\$52,000</p>	<p>Helps support intensive training of 8 teachers and 240 students in low-income Richmond schools in a year-long cycle of classroom workshops, field trips to local creeks or Bay habitat, creek or Bay clean-up projects, and a watershed action project which the students themselves select, plan, and implement.</p>
<p><b>Literacy for Environmental Justice</b> <i>Living Machine at the Living Classroom</i></p>	<p>\$7,500</p>	<p>Literacy for Environmental Justice conducts youth empowerment and environmental education programs in the Hunters Point area. Funding supports the construction of a “Living Machine” wastewater treatment facility at their “Living Classroom” at Heron’s Head Park.</p>
<p><b>Natural Heritage Institute</b> <i>An Evaluation of Water Quality Impacts of Urbanization in the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta</i></p>	<p>\$20,000</p>	<p>Supports a study investigating water quality impacts of the urbanization of agricultural lands on the edges of the Delta. The study will be provided to major stakeholder processes underway that are planning the future of the Delta.</p>

<b>Natural Resources Defense Council</b> <i>Western Water Project</i>	\$25,000	Helps support outreach to environmental justice, farmer, and business communities, and Southern California water exporters to build an informed constituency for better Delta water quality, and to develop consensus points around Delta and San Joaquin River restoration and water quality issues.
<b>Neighborhood House of North Richmond</b> <i>West County Indicators Project</i>	\$35,000	Helps defray the cost of outreach to community members and to support an environmental justice assessment of local environmental, economic and community health concerns and assets – including the water quality of Richmond area watersheds, industrial pollution, and blight and litter contaminating Wildcat Creek and other waterways.

<b>Consumer Federation of California Education Foundation</b> <i>Financial Privacy Report Card</i>	\$21,100	To update a 2004 report card for use by consumers that analyzes the privacy policies of major national financial institutions. The report card will rate companies on the degree to which they exceed minimum statutory requirements, and report on the difficulties and costs businesses encounter in complying with privacy laws.
<b>Electronic Privacy Information Center</b> <i>Privacy Law Sourcebook</i> <i>Privacy and Human Rights Report</i>	\$20,000	To produce annual updates of two reports: the <i>Privacy Law Sourcebook</i> and the <i>Privacy and Human Rights Report</i> . The <i>Privacy Law Sourcebook</i> contains the full text of major privacy laws and is a leading resource for students, attorneys, researchers and journalists. The <i>Privacy and Human Rights Report</i> tracks the adoption of data protection and open government laws in more than 70 countries.
<b>First Amendment Project</b> <i>Expressive Media Law Review</i>	\$20,000	To publish and disseminate a comprehensive review of case law and California statutes, regulations and ordinances related to the issue of privacy rights of consumers of expressive materials (such as books).
